Minutes of Special Meeting, April 15, 1955

A meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on April 15, 1955. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:10 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

It was noted that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

Mrs. Jeannette Stevens was appointed by the Clerk as Secretary of the meeting.

The Clerk inquired if there were any objections to recording the meeting on tape. There was no reply.

The Clerk requested nominations for Chairman. Mr. Jerome Denton nominated Mr. Melville. This was seconded by Mr. Minuse, and carried.

The Clerk read the qualifications of a voter.

Mr. Melville took the Chair.

The Chairman appointed Mr. W. B. Minuse, Mr. Frederick Griffith and Mr. Pierrepont E. Twitchell as tellers.

Mr. Jesaitis moved the following Proposition:

Shall the Setauket School District be authorized to expend for the acquisition of approximately 14 acres of land now owned by Fullerton and Mapp, adjacent to the present site, at \$4,000 per acre, a sum not to exceed \$57,000, and to issue therefor obligations of the District pursuant to the provisions of the Education Law and Local Finance Law, and to levy a tax to be collected in installments for the payment of the principal of and the interest on such obligations.

The proposition was seconded by Mr. Griffith.

The Chairman announced that a Mr. McKenna, a lawyer, and Mr. Ben Kasper an experienced real estate dealer, had been requested to be present in order to answer any technical questions.

A colored slide was projected onto a screen, showing the school site and the land surrounding it.

Mrs. Elzon inquired how many acres comprised the present school property.

Mr. Melville said 13-plus, and all of the land is now in use.

Mr. Twitchell inquired the present enrollment of the school, and some idea of expected growth.

Mr. Melville replied that the present enrollment is 439, with roughly 8% growth anticipated, 'though he said 27% would be more nearly accurate.

Mr. Melville gave a quick explanation of the current building rush.

There was a question from the floor as to who now owns the land in question, and Mr. Melville replied that Fullerton and Mapp have a contract to buy.

Mr. Griffith asked what alternative was offered by the group who were taking a strong stand against the purchase.

Question from the floor: How was financing to be done? Who would decide?

Mr. Melville said the Board would seek the advice of the meeting.

Mrs. Bruce found it difficult to understand how a man can sell land before he has actually bought it, and Mr. Melville tried to explain that it is frequently done with a contract to buy.

Mr. Anderson was anxious to know what the Board's plan was. He read some Dodge reports of April 5 and 11, regarding other schools being built and being added to.

Mr. Griffith called attention to the fact that those figures prove that buildings are needed everywhere because of expansion. He believes it is good the Board has planned thus far, but it is impossible to make a blueprint of what is to come.

Mr. Melville stated that the Board is constantly working on the various phases of the problem; the plant will need to be expanded to continue its usefulness. The Board believes we should make an additional investment of \$57,000 to insure the value of what we have.

To continued questioning about justification for the price being asked for the property, Mr. Melville explained that for every acre Fullerton and Mapp might expect to realize a gross price of \$45,000, making a 10% profit on each acre. He said they were not anxious to sell the land to the school, but would consider it for the price mentioned.

Mr. Anderson asked if Mr. West had been approached directly about purchasing the land, and Mr. Melville said no.

Mr. Burt inquired if it is more desirable to have one site or two, and Mr. Melville said it is much better to have one school, within limits, since overhead costs would be much lower.

Mr. Gelinas said a large school can be better administered, and cheaper.

Mr. Roberge inquired whether we would build extensions or another building.

Mr. Melville said we might divide the elementary and junior high schools.

Question from the floor: Is it legal or possible to table the matter?

Mr. Melville said this was the last day of our option on the property.

Mr. Twitchell noted that the school districts mentioned by Mr. Anderson had to pay enormous prices per acre.

Mr. Reuter said he thought we should determine what we are going to need, with the maximum expansion we can foresee.

Possible purchase of land in South Setauket was discussed, and also on Mt. Gray Road.

Mr. Herman said the real trouble is that the people do not like the sudden rise from \$2,200 to \$4,000 per acre. He requested legal information about condemnation of property.

Mr. McKenna said the overall purchase price might have been \$2,200 per acre, but the 14 acres in question were more desirable than some of the rest of the property. He explained condemnation procedure, and said we would be fortunate if it could be consummated in less than a year.

Question from the floor: If we need more land, where would the Board plan to build?

Mr. Melville said if we are to build any more we should prefer to build on the same site.

A point of order was raised because the Chair was answering questions, so Mr. Melville requested Roscoe Denton Jr. to take the Chair.

Mr. Johnson spoke in favor of buying the land.

Question from the floor: If we consolidate with Stony Brook, what would we do if they did not see fit to have the school here?

Mr. Melville said we are both up to capacity, and it would make no difference.

A statement was made from the floor that the Johann's property on Mt. Gray Road was available for sale, and the owner was willing to divide it.

The Board was asked if it had considered splitting the school at K-3.

Mr. Melville said it has been considered by the Board, but they do not approve of it.

Mr. Melville resumed the Chair.

Mr. Reuter moved for a vote on the question. This was seconded by Mr. Anderson, and a voice vote was taken, which carried the motion.

The voting started at 9:35 p.m.

At 10:05 p.m. Mr. Melville inquired if all had voted. It was moved, seconded and carried that the balloting be closed.


The tellers reported the following count of votes on the proposition:

Minutes of the Annual Meeting, May 3, 1955

The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of the Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, N.Y., held at the Seatuket School, was called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Mr. Alphonso Jesaitis.

The notice of the Annual Meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mr. Jesaitis announced that the meeting was being recorded on a tape recorder, and that if any individual found it objectionable, he could request that it be turned off. There was no response.

The Clerk announced that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.

The Clerk appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Secretary.

Mr. Jesaitis read the qualifications of a voter.

The Clerk asked for nominations for Chairman. Mr. Jerome Denton nominated Mr. Pierrepont Twitchell, and this was seconded by Mr. Herman.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried that nominations be closed. The Clerk cast one vote.

An announcement was made of the winners in the Industrial Arts exhibit being held in the gymnasium.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous Annual Meeting, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried that the minutes be approved as read.

The Treasurer's report was read, and Mr. Denton moved that this be accepted as read. It was seconded by Mr. Griffith, and carried.

The Chairman nominated the following tellers:

The Chairman read nominating petition for Alphonso E. Jesaitis as member of the Board, to succeed himself.

The voting started at 8:25 p.m. At 8:40 the Clerk asked if all had voted, and declared the polls closed.

The Clerk read the proposed budget for the year 1955-56.

The tellers returned from counting the ballots, and Mrs. Mitton reported for the tellers:

54 votes cast
1 vote void
1 vote for Donald Lange
52 votes for Alphonso Jesaitis

The Chairman declared Mr. Jesaitis reelected to the Board.

Mr. Denton moved that the budget be adopted as read. This was seconded by Mr. Anderson.

The Chairman declared the meeting open for discussion. Various questions about the budget were answered.

Mr. Reuter asked if the five-year contract for tuition at Port Jefferson High School had been executed.

Mr. Gelinas said it had not.

There being no more questions on the budget, the voting began at 8:45 p.m., and was completed by 9 o'clock.

The tellers retired to count the votes.

The Chairman called for new business.

Mr. Franklin McColgin offered a resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Herman. There was some discussion of the resolution.

The principal reported that he had called Mr. Ormsby on the telephone, and Mr. Ormsby said the law does not forbid the candidate's standing up and stating his platform; he said that they have a legal right to do so if formally nominated.

The resolution was amended with the approval of Mr. Herman, who had seconded the motion, and was presented again to the voters in its final wording, as follows:

WHEREAS, There are some voters of the Setauket School District who do not know all of the candidates for the School Board; and

WHEREAS, To avoid confusion or mistaken identity, and to serve as a means of introduction; therefore,

RESOLVED: That at school board elections, each formally nominated candidate for the school board who is present at such meeting be presented to the assembly by the Chairman before the vote is taken.

RESOLVED; That each candidate may submit to the Secretary before the meeting a short biographic account of himself, to a maximum of 100 words, to be read by the Chairman as his introduction.

The tellers returned and reported on the budget vote, as follows:

50 votes cast
47 votes - Yes
2 votes - No
1 vote void.

The Chairman declared the budget approved, and dismissed the tellers with thanks.

The Chairman called for a hand vote on the resolution proposed by Mr. McColgin; there were 30 hands in favor and 7 against, so the Chairman declared the resolution carried.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.



Minutes of Special Meeting, June 20, 1955

A meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on June 20, 1955. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

It was noted that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

Mrs. Jeannette Stevens was appointed by the Clerk as Secretary of the meeting.

The Clerk read the qualifications of a voter, and also mentioned the fact that a voter cannot legally vote in both Setauket and Stony Brook.

The Clerk requested nominations for Chairman. Mr. Pierrepont Twitchell was nominated, and this was seconded. There being no other nominations, it was moved and seconded that nominations be closed.

Mr. Twitchell took the Chair.

Mr. Denzin moved the following Proposition:

RESOLVED:

- (a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, Suffolk County, New York, is hereby authorized to purchase approximately 14 acres of land now owned by Fullerton & Mapp adjacent to and southwest of the present school site and to pay therefor \$4,000 per acre and a total sum not to exceed \$57,000;

- (b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing object or purpose in the amount of \$57,000 to be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education of said District;
- (c) That, in anticipation of the collection of said tax, bonds and notes of the District are hereby authorized to be issued at one time or from time to time in the respective aggregate principal amounts of not exceeding \$57,000; and that a tax is hereby voted to pay interest on said bonds and notes when due.

The Proposition was seconded, and the Chair declared the meeting open for discussion.

Mr. Bracker objected to the wording of the proposition, stating that the property was "owned" by Fullerton and Mapp. He said he believed this was out of order.

Mrs. Bruce stated that Mrs. Cecilia Hawkins said she would be willing to sell her property to the school.

Mr. Jesaitis said he had spoken to Mrs. Hawkins three or four weeks prior to the meeting. He said all that she was willing to sell was the northern part, simply for straightening out the school line.

Mr. Jesaitis answered Mr. Bracker, stating that all dealings had been with Fullerton and Mapp; they have a contract of sale, which is good enough for the purpose.

Mr. Bracker said his objection is to the wording "now owned by". He said the meeting was improperly called, and he believed the District would not be right in voting on it.

The Chair ruled that the call to the meeting was in order.

Mr. Anderson asked about the possibility of postponing the meeting.

Mrs. Twomey wanted to know if a parochial school should be built by the Catholic Church, would we then need the land.

Mr. Jesaitis said the Board believes we would still need the land, even so.

Mr. Peters inquired about the legality of voting a second time on the question.

The Chairman said he believed it is perfectly legal to advertise and offer for vote any proposition properly presented, and ruled that it was properly presented in this case.

Mr. Brenner asked if there were any possibility of certiori proceedings.

The Chair declined to answer.

Mr. Gelinas said it is quite permissible to discuss the proposition during the voting. He said the discussion could not be stopped without a two-thirds vote of the assembled voters.

Mr. Brenner questioned the legality of the discussion during voting.

Mr. Herman asked why the hurry, if the fourteen acres were not to be used for a school building.

Mr. Spear said he believed more discussion was in order. He moved that the voting be postponed until 8:30. This was seconded.

The Chairman said he was not certain about the legality of this, but asked for a rising vote. the motion was defeated, so the Chair stated that the voting would begin at 8 p.m. as advertised.

The Chairman appointed the following tellers:

Mr. Anderson (refused)
Mr. Payne (refused)
Mr. Rankin (refused)
Mr. Herman (refused)

Mr. Spear (accepted)
Mr. Miller (accepted)
Mr. Slavin (accepted)

The voting started at 8 p.m.

Mr. Twomey asked if the options on the land cost the District money.

Mr. Jesaitis said the first one cost \$100.

Question from the floor: What authorization had the Board to spend the money for an option?

Mr. Jesaitis said the Board has the authority to make such expenditures if it believes they are necessary.

Mr. Melville corrected the statement of Mr. Jesaitis, saying that no money had been paid by the School District for any option on the land in question.

Mrs. Jenkins asked who gets up the figures regarding population.

The Chairman said he had been on the Citizens' Committee which studied the question. Their recommendations were out of line, but represented the best they could do at that time.

Mr. Bracker made a motion that the School Board be restricted from appropriating any funds for the purpose of obtaining options on the property directly to the south of the existing school site.

The Chairman checked with the Principal, and the following ruling was read from the Handbook on New York State Education Law:

"At special school district meetings, may school business in general be discussed?

"The only matters that can be considered are those that were listed in the notice that was posted advertising the meeting. The form that is sometimes used to call a meeting 'for the purpose of considering such business as may lawfully come before the meeting' has no force or effect as applied to a special meeting where the objects must be specifically stated."

The polls were declared closed at 10 p.m., and the tellers retired to count the votes.

The tellers returned to the meeting and reported as follows:

Number of ballots cast -	508
Number in favor	251
Number against -	257

The Chair declared the proposition defeated, and dismissed the tellers with thanks.

The meeting adjourned at 10:40 p.m.

PROPOSITION #1

RESOLVED:

- (a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, in the County of Suffolk, New York, is hereby authorized to construct a 10-room addition to the existing Setauket School building in the district, on a part of the site of the existing school, to grade and improve the site and purchase the necessary original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purpose for which such addition is to be used, at an estimated maximum cost not to exceed \$255,000, including

preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof;

- (b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing purpose in an amount not to exceed \$255,000, to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education.
- (c) That in anticipation of the said tax, bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not to exceed \$255,000; that a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on the said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

PROPOSITION #2

RESOLVED:

- (a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, in the County of Suffolk, New York, is hereby authorized to acquire by purchase as an addition to the site of the existing Setauket School in the district and herein designated as such addition, the certain piece or parcel of land adjacent thereto now owned by Fullerton and Mapp, containing approximately 5 acres more or less at an estimated maximum cost not to exceed \$20,000, said parcel of land being described by metes and bounds as follows:

Beginning at a point which is the Southwesterly corner of the parcel of land intended to be purchased, and running thence along the present boundary of the property formerly owned by Celia Gillette Hawkins, and now owned by the Setauket School District North $16^{\circ} 47' 40''$ East 192.46 feet; thence South along the land of the Setauket School $73^{\circ} 35' 20''$ East 676.19 feet; thence North $17^{\circ} 56'$ East 100 feet; thence South $70^{\circ} 50' 50''$ East 129.85 feet; thence South $17^{\circ} 16' 30''$ West 330 feet more or less; thence North $70^{\circ} 28' 40''$ more or less 806.04 feet more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

- (b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing object or purpose in the amount of \$20,000 to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education of said District:
- (c) That, in anticipation of the collection of said tax, bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not to exceed \$20,000; that a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on the said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

Minutes of Annual Meeting, May 1, 1956

The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of the Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, held at the Setauket School, was called to order at 8 p.m. by Mr. Alphonso E. Jesaitis.

The notice of the Annual Meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mr. Jesaitis announced that the notice of the meeting was published in the Port Jefferson Times and the Three Village Herald, and posted in at least twenty of the most public places within the district, at least twenty days prior to the meeting.

The Clerk announced that the meeting was being recorded, and asked if there were any objection. There was no response.

Mr. Jesaitis appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Secretary.

The Clerk requested nominations for a Chairman. Mr. Mitton was nominated and this was seconded.

It was moved and seconded that nominations be closed.

The nomination of Mr. Mitton was carried and he took the Chair.

Mrs. Stevens read the minutes of the last Annual Meeting.

Mr. Sam Bolden moved that the minutes be approved as read. This was seconded by Mr. John Brierly and carried.

Mrs. Stevens read the Treasurer's report. There were some questions on the report which were answered by Mr. Gelinas, and then Mr. Jerome Denton moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted as read. This was seconded by Mr. Bubnis, and carried.

The Chairman appointed the following tellers:

Mr. John Leonard
Mr. Fred Harrison
Mrs. Wayne Frank
Mr. George Taylor

Mr. Mitton read the qualifications of a voter.

The Chairman commented that no nominations were allowed from the floor. He read the names of the nominees for whom petitions had been received.

Mr. McColgin moved that the polls be kept open at least one hour.

Mr. Herman suggested that the motion be amended to read "at least one hour or until everyone in the hall has voted." This was seconded and the amendment was carried.

Mr. McColgin's motion was seconded with the amendment, and carried.

Mr. Mitton called attention to the two ballots and told how to mark them. He also noted that although there were two blank spaces on each ballot, only one name could be written in.

The Chairman read the declaration to be signed by each voter and called for any questions.

Mr. Anderson asked if the budget could be discussed first, and Mr. Mitton said no.

The Chairman asked the candidates to stand.

The voting started at 8:47 p.m.

At 9:49 the Chairman asked if all had voted, and called the balloting closed.

The tellers retired to count the votes.

Mr. Jesaitis read the proposed budget.

Mr. Mitton appointed the following inspectors for the budget ballots:

Mr. Robert Lyon
Mrs. James Twomey
Mrs. Selden Converse
Mr. Attmore Robinson Jr.

The Chairman read a report from the Board of Education regarding a request from the Infant Jesus Parochial School, requesting that the District furnish health services for the children from the District who attend that school.

Mr. Jerome Denton moved that the budget be accepted as presented. This was seconded by Mr. Wishart.

Miss Windrow asked if transportation included in the budget allows for additional service next year for the athletic program. There was considerable discussion and Mr. Jesaitis recommended that nothing be done to add to the budget at this time, but wait until next fall and let the Board investigate and make some recommendation.

Mr. Denton moved that the budget be adopted as presented.

Mr. Alleman asked about a \$10,000 increase in the building maintenance category. Mr. Gelinas explained that in order to have the new building plans approved by Albany, it was necessary to have certain alterations in the existing building, and to transfer the homemaking department to the annex. These would be covered by this item.

There were more questions on the budget, and then the Chairman re-read the proposed amendment to the budget.

Mrs. Twomey moved the amendment, as follows:

The sum of \$800 is hereby added to the 1956-57 budget and authorized for the purpose of financing certain health and welfare services for Setauket pupils attending the Infant Jesus Parochial School in Port Jefferson during the coming school year, according to Section 912 of the Education Law.

This motion was seconded.

Mr. Herman warned that once started, it could be required for other private schools.

Mr. Stankaitis called attention to the tax money saved by having children go to outside schools. He said Infant Jesus offered to furnish health services at \$5 per pupil, instead of the \$20 allowed in the amendment.

Father Herold spoke of the comparison of \$800 for health services for approximately 40 children, as against a cost of \$16,000 if we were to educate them in the Setauket School.

After more discussion, the Chairman explained the voting procedure and the voting on the amendment started at 10:50 p.m. and ended at 11 p.m., when the inspectors retired to count the votes.

The voting on the main motion for the budget started at 11:10 p.m.



1. Why do we need two additional buses?

Answer: If we are to maintain our present transportation standards, it is necessary to provide bus facilities for new students. During the past three years we have had an increase of 137 pupils who require transportation.

In the fall of the current year (1956-57), double sessions are operating for ten classes in the Setauket School. The double session arrangement is temporary until the occupancy of the annex some time in December or January.

With the elimination of double sessions when the rooms now in process of construction are occupied, all pupils will have to report at the same time in the morning and be dismissed at the same time in the afternoon. In other words, those who are now arriving at the school at 8 a.m. and those who are sent home at 4 p.m. will be restored to the schedule followed by full-time students.

In short, we have been able to transport with existing equipment all pupils who required transportation this fall because we have been operating on double sessions. With the elimination of part-time classes, we shall require two additional buses if we are to continue transporting these pupils.

2. How far should children walk to school before transportation is provided?

Answer: The State Department is not very specific in this respect since circumstances differ in each community. However, the law does state that:

A school district is required to provide transportation for all children who live more than two miles (if elementary pupils - K-6) or three miles (if high school pupils - Gr. 7-12) from the schools they legally attend. (Sec. 3621)

It might be pointed out that the objection to requiring children to walk to school is not the distance but the danger or risk involved in walking along highways with modern high speed transportation and with no sidewalks.

3. What is the usual distance that pupils must walk to a main trunk school bus route?

Answer: It is thought that in a large majority of cases, children can conveniently walk a distance of at least a mile to a main trunk bus route. Circumstances, however, may modify this policy and it is usually a matter to be determined locally. (See P. 73, Handbook of New York State Educ. Law.)

4. Is there any State Aid for transportation?

Answer: Yes. The State Aid formula is based partly on the number of pupils living beyond 1.5 m. from school. Certain students, therefore, bring transportation State Aid to the District although they live within the two or three mile limits described in Question 2. No State Aid is available for the transportation of students living within this 1.5 mile radius.

5. What is the definition of "distance" as applied to school transportation?

Answer: "Distance" as considered in the law is measured by the nearest available road to the school.

6. How much State Aid do we get for our transportation?

Answer: In 1955--56, \$27,050 was spent for transportation. Our State Aid that year was \$13,969. In other words, about 50% of the cost of our transportation during that year was refunded to the District in State Aid.

7. How many pupils are now (October 7, 1956) being transported?

Answer: 523 pupils as follows:

- (a) 403 in local school
- (b) 42 in parochial school
- (c) 78 Port Jefferson High School

8. How many of these pupils live within 1.5 miles from school?

Answer: 114 pupils (15 kindergarten, 52 Gr. 1-4, 47 Gr. 5-9)

9. What is the grade distribution of Setauket School youngsters being transported?

Answer: 48 pupils are in kindergarten

10. In 1953, how many transported pupils lived within 1.5 miles of the School?

Answer: 130 pupils (note: we now have 114 in this category)

Answer: In 1953, 275 were being transported to the local school, 38 to the Parochial School and 73 to Port Jefferson High School; a total of 386.

12. How many more pupils are we transporting now than we did three years ago?

Answer: 137 pupils

13. How many extra trips were needed last year (1955-56) for Junior High School athletic games away from home?

Answer: 21 trips

- (a) 8 of these trips were by buses provided by Mr. Eikov, our contractor.
- (b) 13 of these trips were made by private cars, either that of the Physical Education director or those of parents.

Minutes of Annual Meeting, May 7, 1957

The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of the Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, held at the Setauket School, was called to order at 8:10 p.m. by Mr. Alphonso E. Jesaitis.

The notice of the Annual Meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mr. Jesaitis announced that the notice of the meeting was published in the Port Jefferson Times and the Three Village Herald, and posted in at least twenty of the most public places within the district at least twenty days prior to the meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Clerk of the meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis requested nominations for a Chairman. Mr. John Mitton was nominated and this was seconded; Mr. Harold Baker was nominated and his nomination was seconded.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed.

Mr. Jesaitis called for a showing of hands, and then declared Mr. Mitton Chairman.

Mr. Mitton took the Chair.

Mr. Melville moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with. This was seconded.

Mrs. Bruce asked if this was the proper procedure, and Mr. Mitton replied that it was permissible if approved by the meeting.

The Chairman called for a voice vote on the motion, and it was carried.

The Chairman requested a motion regarding voting hours.

Mr. Denton made the following motion:

"Resolved that polls be declared open for the election of Trustees, beginning at the present time and continuing open until 9:30 p.m., voting to take place in the cafeteria immediately adjacent to the auditorium."

This motion was seconded.

Mr. Crawford moved the following amendment to the motion:

"... continuing open until 9:30 p.m. or until all qualified voters in the auditorium or in the cafeteria have had an opportunity to vote, voting to take place in the cafeteria immediately adjacent to the auditorium."

The amendment was seconded and carried.

The Chairman read the motion again, and called for a voice vote.

The Chairman declared the motion carried, and announced that the polls would be open from 8:20 until 9:30 p.m., or until all qualified voters in the auditorium or in the cafeteria have had an opportunity to vote. The Chairman stated that he presumed the amendment could be stretched to include the hallway between the auditorium and the cafeteria.

The Chairman named the inspectors of election, as follows:

Gabriel Jacobs - accepted
Harold Baker - accepted
Mrs. Charles Howell - declined
Mrs. Guy Castro - declined
Mrs. Eugene Hutchinson - accepted

The Chairman instructed the inspectors in their duties.

The Chairman introduced one of the candidates, Mr. Roscoe Denton Sr.; Mr. Paul Denzin was absent.

Mr. Denton spoke a few words, and Mr. Jesaitis spoke for Mr. Denzin.

The Chairman announced that voters might leave the auditorium to cast their votes, and then return to the meeting to consider the budget.

Mr. Jesaitis read the proposed budget.

Mr. Melville moved the adoption of the budget. This was seconded.

There were a few questions on various items in the budget, and these were answered by Mr. Melville.

Mrs. John Stevens questioned the amount of \$250 for library books, believing it to be insufficient.

Dr. Gelinas explained that some books are also purchased under the category of textbooks.

Mrs. Converse asked if the survey recently made in the school had recommended enlarging the library.

Dr. Gelinas suggested that the school could try to make more use of the Emma S. Clark Library.

Mrs. John Stevens moved an amendment to increase the item for library books from \$250 to \$500. This was seconded.

The Chair warned that it would be necessary to vote on this amendment by ballot.

Mr. Melville reassured the District that sufficient books would be purchased, and said he doubted that the amendment would be necessary.

Mrs. Stevens withdrew the amendment.

Mr. Herman requested an explanation of the additional \$300 item for health services in the parochial school in Port Jefferson. He asked if this has been tested in court.

Mr. Melville read a letter from the Mrs. Brind of the Education Department, quoting the law which makes it necessary to pay health service expenses for our children attending a parochial school in another public school district.

There were a few more questions from the floor, which were answered by Mr. Melville.

The Chairman appointed the following tellers for the budget vote:

Arthur Phillips

Mr. Melville gave some comparative tax rates, and showed that Setauket was the 7th from the lowest in the 35 districts comprising our supervisory district.

The Chairman instructed the voters on how to proceed with voting on the budget, and the voting started at 9:15 p.m.

The tellers retired to count the votes on the budget at 9:30 p.m.

Mr. Melville moved the following resolutions:

Resolved that in the forthcoming school years, election of trustees shall take place between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on the Wednesday next following the day designated for holding the annual meeting.

Resolved that the Board of Education ^{may} introduce the practice of personal registration according to Section 2014 of the Education Law.

These resolutions were seconded by Mr. Minuse.

There was a question from the floor as to the cost of such an arrangement, and Mr. Melville estimated that it would cost approximately \$75.

Mr. Melville read the law which covers this method of voting.

The Chair called for a voice vote, and the motion was carried unanimously.

At 9:40 the Chairman of Tellers for the budget vote reported the following results:



Minutes of Special Meeting, October 14, 1957

A meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No.2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on October 14, 1957. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:30 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

It was noted that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

Mrs. Jeannette Stevens was appointed by the Clerk as Clerk of the meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis called for nominations for Chairman.

Mr. Denton nominated Mr. Ward Melville. This was seconded and carried.

Mr. Melville took the Chair, but commented that there had been no opportunity for opposition. He called for any other nominations, but none were forthcoming.

Mr. Denton moved the following proposition:

RESOLVED: That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No.2, Town of Brookhaven, County of Suffolk, New York, is hereby authorized to construct eleven (11) classrooms, plus auxiliary facilities adjacent to the present school building and on the same parcel of land upon which the existing school plant is located, and to expend for the construction of this structure, for the grading, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for the purpose for which such building is to be used, and including preliminary costs and other costs incidental to said object or purpose and the financing thereof, a sum not to exceed \$360,000.

(b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing purpose in an amount not to exceed \$360,000, to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education.

(c) That in anticipation of the said tax, bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not exceeding \$360,000; that a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on the said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

This was seconded by Mr. Minuse.

The Chairman read the qualifications of a voter.

The Chairman appointed the following tellers:

Mr. Jack Roberge - declined
Mrs. Donald Cupp
Mr. John Leonard
Mrs. L. E. Anderson

Mr. Melville spoke on behalf of the Board of Education. He said that if the proposition should be approved, the Board would wait until the last possible minute before accepting bids for the construction of a new building, in case Setauket and Stony Brook should decide to consolidate; in which case a new school would probably be built between the two districts. However, if the two districts do not decide promptly, the new Setauket School building will be started in time to open in September of next year.

Mr. Melville explained the proposed plans for the new building, which would be separate from the present building, but connected by a covered walk.

There were a number of questions concerning the plans for the new building, and these were answered by Mr. Melville.

Mr. Melville explained that the Board would recommend to the District that about one third of the cost of complete re-grading of the land be spent from this bond issue, and the balance could be paid from taxes over the next two years, thus saving considerable interest.

Mrs. Bruce thought it would be a good idea to wait a year until we know what is going to happen.

Mr. Melville stated that the Board is certain that the population growth will be sufficient to fill the additional eleven rooms next September.

Mr. Herman spoke in favor of the twenty-six-child classroom recommended by Albany.

Mr. Melville stated that the voters of the District can choose the quality of education they wish for their children.

Mr. McColgin moved that the polls remain open until 10 p.m. or until all in the room who have signified their wish to vote have voted. This was seconded and carried.

Minutes of Annual Meeting, May 6, 1958

The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, held at the Setauket School, was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mr. Alphonso E. Jesaitis.

The notice of the Annual Meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mr. Jesaitis announced that notice of the meeting was published in the Three Village Herald four times, as required by law.

Mr. Jesaitis appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Clerk of the Meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis read the qualifications of a voter, and then requested nominations for Chairman.

Mr. Jerome Denton nominated Mr. Ward Melville. This was seconded.

Mr. Louis Gerold was nominated, and this was seconded.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed.

Mr. Jesaitis called for a showing of hands, and declared Mr. Melville elected as Chairman.

Mr. Melville took the Chair.

Mrs. Stevens read the minutes of the last Annual Meeting. It was moved, seconded and carried that the minutes be accepted as read.

The Chairman named the inspectors for election of trustee as follows:

Louis Gerold - declined
Harold Weisenreider - declined
Mrs. Townsend Bennett - accepted
Harold Baker - declined
John Mitton - accepted
Ernest Andrews - accepted

Question from the floor: Is any check made of the qualifications of the voters?

Mr. Melville said that none has been made so far - that the tellers are expected to be careful, and the voters are required to sign affidavits stating their qualifications.

The Chairman introduced the two candidates, and each spoke a few words.

Mr. Harris moved that members of the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, Suffolk County, New York, shall be elected for three year terms, in accordance with Chapter 38 of the Laws of 1958. This was seconded by Miss Windrow.

The Chair called for a showing of hands, and declared the motion carried.

At 8:30 the Chairman announced that the polls were open in the cafeteria for the trustee vote.

The Chair appointed the following tellers for the budget and transportation proposition votes:

Harold Baker - accepted
Louis Gerold - accepted
Harold Weisenreider - declined
Mrs. William Osborne - accepted

The budget was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk.

Miss Fallon asked for an explanation of the increase in Capital Outlay Item #2 - from \$13,000 to \$50,000.

Mr. Melville asked if there were any objection to his answering questions as a member of the Board. There were none, so he proceeded to explain that it is necessary to furnish drainage gutters, dry wells and sinking basins lined with sand for seepage, in order to dispose of water crossing the school property from elsewhere. He said we must also add to and relocate our fence to surround the entire tract of land now belonging to the school, and the ground must be terraced in order to be useful for school purposes. Another necessary item is the parking lot.

It was requested that the item for the Board of Cooperative Educational Services be explained, and Mr. Melville said this is an organization which provides part-time teachers, dental hygienists, and so forth for school districts not requiring full services in certain categories.

Mr. Harris called attention to the fact that \$3,000 of the Library Books item was intended for the Emma S. Clark Library.

It was moved that the budget be amended to add \$2,000 to Item 15 in Capital Outlay, for the use of the Setauket School library only, making a total of \$8,000. This motion was seconded by Mr. Jacobs.

Mr. Melville explained that the only place taxpayers may provide tax money for a library is in the school budget, and that The Emma S. Clark Library is the only one in the County which has never had such help.

Mr. Melville introduced Mr. Sinclair Hatch, who explained the Clark Library's need for money due to the growth of the community. He said part of the \$3,000 would be for books and part for services.

Mrs. Pereira wanted to be sure the District understood that the school library is at present being used as a classroom. She expressed a desire to add more to the budget to cover a librarian's salary.

Mrs. Pereira moved that \$5,000 be added to the budget to pay a librarian's salary. This was seconded by John Baldwin.

The Chairman called for a voice vote and declared the motion defeated.

Miss Windrow expressed her opinion that the ^{school}/library was more important than the work on the grounds.

Mr. Herman inquired when the library room will be free for use as a library.

Mr. Melville replied that it could be released as soon as the new building is finished.

Mr. Melville explained that the cost of a number of items had been increased since the budget was prepared.

It was moved that the budget be amended to increase it by \$6,175, as follows: Under Instructional Services, an additional \$4,300 to cover an increase in tuition charges at Port Jefferson High School, and \$1,500 to cover an extension course in Marine Biology this summer; under Auxiliary Agencies, an additional \$375 representing increased fees for health examinations.

The motion was seconded by Jerome Denton.

The Chairman called for a voice vote, and the motion was carried.

After further discussion, the Chairman called the tellers and voting on the budget and the transportation proposition began at 9:30 p.m.

Mr. Melville requested Mr. Roscoe Denton Sr. to take his place as Chairman.

At 10:30 p.m. the Chairman asked if everyone in the Auditorium had voted, and the tellers retired to count the votes.

The tellers for the budget and transportation proposition returned at 11 p.m. and the Chairman read their report as follows:

The Chairman declared the budget and the proposition approved, and dismissed the tellers with thanks.



Minutes of Special Meeting, November 10, 1959

A meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on November 10, 1959. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:30 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

It was noted that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

Mrs. Jeannette Stevens was appointed by the Clerk as secretary of the meeting.

The Clerk called on Mr. John Mitton to assume his duties as Permanent Chairman of the meeting, having previously been appointed by the Board according to law. Mr. Mitton took the chair, and explained that a change in the Education Law had required the appointment by the Board of Education of a permanent chairman in advance of the meeting.

The Chairman called the following persons to assume their duties as inspectors of election, having previously been appointed by the Board of Education according to law:

John Foley
Richard Bangs
Jerome Denton
Gabriel Jacobs

Mr. Richard Bangs, not being present, the Chairman appointed Dr. Willard Constantinides to serve in his place. Mr. Jerome Denton, refusing to serve, was replaced by Dr. John Lange.

Mr. Jerome Denton moved that the polls be opened immediately after the proposition is moved and seconded, and to remain open until ten o'clock, and until everyone in the room at ten o'clock shall have an opportunity to vote.

Mrs. Klein moved that the time be extended to 10:30 o'clock. This amendment was seconded and carried.

Mr. Denton's motion was seconded and carried.

On behalf of the Board of Education, Mr. Melville moved the following proposition:

"RESOLVED: That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, County of Suffolk, New York, is hereby authorized to construct thirteen (13) classrooms, plus auxiliary facilities, adjacent to the present primary annex and on the same parcel of land upon which the existing school plant is located, and to expend for this construction, for the grading, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for the purpose for which such building is to be used, and including preliminary costs and other costs incidental to said object or purpose, and the financing thereof, a sum not to exceed \$400,000.

(b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing purpose in an amount not to exceed \$400,000, to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education.

(c) That in anticipation of the said tax, bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not exceeding \$400,000; that a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on the said bonds as the same shall become due and payable."

The proposition was seconded by Mr. Denton.

Mr. Melville drew attention to the fact that this building is recommended by the Board as the most economical method of providing necessary facilities, regardless of what reorganization may lie ahead.

The Chairman requested the tellers to go to the cafeteria, and declared the polls open.

The Chairman read the qualifications of a voter.

The Chairman invited discussion on the proposition.

Mr. Reuter inquired if the Board would tell of some alternative suggestions which had been considered.

Mr. Melville said there was no alternative worth considering. The proposed building seemed to be the logical, sensible and the only possible solution to the present need, and will be needed no matter what develops with other districts in the future.

Mrs. Klein wanted to know how many years this building will suit the purpose.

Mr. Melville said that a year from now the Board will probably come back to the voters for another building. It is possible that we might be consolidated with another district by that time, and it would be reasonable to build in some other area.

At 10:30 p.m. the Chairman inquired if everyone in the building had voted, and declared the polls closed.

The tellers retired to count the ballots.


At 11 p.m. the Chief Inspector of Elections reported the count, and the Chairman gave the following report:

Minutes of Annual Meeting, May 3, 1960

The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of Union Free School District #2, Town of Brookhaven, held at the Setauket School, was called to order at 8 p.m. by Mr. Alphonso E. Jesaitis.

The notice of the Annual Meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mr. Jesaitis announced that notice of the meeting was published in the Three Village Herald four times, as required by law.

Mr. Jesaitis appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Clerk of the Meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis turned the meeting over to the Chairman, Mr. John Mitton.

Mr. Mitton read a letter from the Board of Education, appointing him as Chairman for the Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Stevens read the minutes of the last Annual Meeting, and it was moved, seconded and carried that the minutes be accepted as read.

The Chairman appointed the following election inspectors:

Mr. John Hockman
Mr. Willard Constantinides
Mr. Fred Harrison

The Chairman introduced the candidates, and Mrs. McColgin, Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Denton each spoke a few words.

The Chairman requested a motion from the floor regarding closing time for the polls.

The following resolution was moved, seconded and carried unanimously:

Resolved: that the polls for the election of trustees be open from 8:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., or until everyone qualified to vote who is in the assembly has had an opportunity to cast his vote.

The Chairman appointed the following budget inspectors:

Mrs. Betty Griffith
Mr. Joseph Bilicki
Mr. Carl Hulse
Mr. Harold Baker

Mr. Baker asked if a name already on one ballot could be written in on the other ballot. The Chairman said it could.

Mr. Jesaitis started to read the budget.

The reading was interrupted to introduce Mr. George Taylor, the fourth candidate, who had just entered the auditorium.

After Mr. Taylor spoke a few words, the reading of the budget continued, but was interrupted again at 8:30 p.m. for the announcement of the opening of the polls.

At the completion of his reading of the budget, Mr. Jesaitis moved its approval as read.

There were some questions from the floor, and the Principal explained various items in the budget. He also gave a report on the progress of the school library.

The Chairman invited a representative of the Emma S. Clark Memorial Library to present a resolution.

Mr. Sinclair Hatch explained that a new law had been passed which required that any addition to the school budget for library purposes must be presented as a separate item. Mr. Hatch also gave a resumé of the phenomenal growth of the Emma S. Clark Library.

Mr. Hatch moved the following resolution:

Resolved: that the School District appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the 1960-61 fiscal year, to be paid to the Emma S. Clark Memorial Library for the furnishing of fine library service to the residents of the School District. ^{free}

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Elzon.

Mr. Hatch answered a few questions from the floor.

The Chairman explained that this motion was separate from the budget, and must be voted on a separate ballot.

Mr. Mitton suggested that in order to expedite matters, a motion could be made to set aside rules of order, allowing the assembly to vote for both amendment and budget at one time. The motion was made from the floor, and seconded.

The Chairman explained that the motion must be approved by a two-thirds majority, and called the tellers to be instructed.

The Chairman called for a hand vote, and declared the motion passed unanimously that the vote be on the main question and on the amendment at one time.

The Chairman asked if there were any other amendments. There was no answer, so he explained the method of voting.

The Chairman mentioned the possibility of a telephone tax being collected for the use of the school. He explained that the matter must be held open to a public hearing, but that the final decision would lie with the Board of Education.

Mrs. Elzon questioned the advisability of having the State take over the telephone tax from the Federal government.

Mr. Mitton explained that this was merely an opportunity for the voters to express their opinions as a guide to the Board.

It was moved, seconded and carried that voting on the budget should begin, and voting started at 9:10 p.m.

At 10:30 p.m. the Chairman announced the closing of the ballot boxes for budget and amendment.

At 11 p.m. the Chairman of Tellers for the budget vote reported the following results:





Minutes of Special Meeting, June 14, 1961

A special meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on June 14, 1961. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:30 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mr. Jesaitis, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mrs. Jeannette Stevens was appointed by the Clerk as Clerk of the meeting.

Mr. Jesaitis called on Mr. John Mitton to serve as Permanent Chairman of the meeting. Mr. Mitton took the Chair, and read the letter which he had received, appointing him as Chairman.

Mr. Mitton noted that the meeting would be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

The Chairman reminded those present that this was a special meeting, called for the purpose of voting on the proposition, and that any other subjects would be out of order.

The Chairman called the following persons to serve as tellers:

At the request of the Chairman, it was moved seconded and carried that the polls be open from 9 to 10:30 p.m., or until all those in the room at that time had voted.

The proposition, as read by the Clerk, was moved and seconded.

RESOLVED:

(a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, County of Suffolk, State of New York, is hereby authorized to purchase approximately 18.8 acres of land, and to pay therefor a total sum not to exceed \$46,500. This property is bounded and described as follows:

"Commencing at a concrete monument set for a bound at the northeasterly corner hereof, at a point on the westerly side of Pond Path and from said point of beginning thence running (1) the following courses and distances by and along the westerly side of Pond Path:

Mrs. Elzon inquired about the price per acre, and Mr. Peters said it would be about \$2,473.47 per acre.

Mr. Peters gave a short talk, saying that a new building was being planned for a K-6 school on the new site by September, 1962.

There were a number of questions about the size of the building, the size of classrooms, the height of the building, and a possible high school, but the Chairman reminded the meeting that such questions were out of order, as not bearing on the proposition.

Mr. Melville explained that the proposed land purchase was in the heart of probable future growth of the district.

It was suggested that 18.8 acres was not large enough, but Mr. Melville explained that it would be large enough for the proposed plant, and the Board would try to keep at least one piece of property ahead of building needs.

It was stated that an information meeting would be held prior to presenting a new building proposition to the District for a vote.

Mrs. Spurgeon inquired about a model school to be run by the new college in Setauket. Mr. Melville said so far as he knows, there will be no model school.

Mr. Peters said that all present facilities are being used to capacity, and putting another K-6 school on the present site would make it too crowded; also, there is going to be a need for a school in South Setauket.

Mr. Melville explained that the 8-district centralization plan was still pending in Albany, and that until that matter is settled, this Board cannot make long-range plans.

Mr. Miller asked what the State Department expected as a maximum acreage per K-6 school, and Dr. Gelinis said 18 acres.

It was questioned whether it might not be better to purchase 30 acres and plan a K-8 school. Mr. Melville said the State would not permit this. He said a special concession had permitted us to have a K-9 school originally, but usually only a K-6 would be allowed.

At 10:30 the tellers retired to count the ballots.

At 10:40 the Chief Inspector of Ballots reported the count, and the Chairman read the following report:

Minutes of Special Meeting, August 5, 1963

A special meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No.2 of the Town of Brookhaven was held at the Setauket School on August 5, 1963. The Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:30 p.m.

The notice of the meeting, advertised according to law, was read by Mrs. McColgin, Clerk of the District. A copy of that notice is a part of these minutes.

Mrs. McColgin appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens Clerk of the Meeting.

Mrs. McColgin called on Mr. John Mitton to serve as Permanent Chairman of the meeting. Mr. Mitton took the Chair.

Mr. Melville moved that the meeting be governed by Robert's Rules of Order. This was seconded from the floor, and carried.

Mr. Melville moved Proposition 1 and Proposition 2, as read by the Clerk, and this was seconded by Mr. Crawford.

Proposition No.1

- RESOLVED: (a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No.2, Town of Brookhaven, County of Suffolk, New York, is hereby authorized, subject to the conditions hereinafter stated, to construct 20 classrooms and auxiliary facilities on a certain tract of land owned by the School District on Pond Path, Setauket, Town of Brookhaven, said site hereby designated as the site of the proposed 20 classrooms, and to expend for the construction of such school project, for the grading of the site, and for the purchase of original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for the purpose for which such facilities are to be used, also including preliminary costs and costs incidental to said object or purpose, and the financing thereof, a sum not to exceed \$960,000.
- (b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing purpose in an amount not to exceed \$960,000, to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education.

- (b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing purpose in an amount not to exceed \$72,000, to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education.
- (c) That in anticipation of the said tax, bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not to exceed \$72,000; that a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on the said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

The Chairman invited any questions, but there were none.

Mr. Mitton read the qualifications of a voter, and again invited questions.

Mr. Melville was asked the actual price of the land. He said it would be \$70,700.

There was a question about the location of the land, and Mr. Melville said the description should have been worded "east to Pond Path."

Colonel Norris called attention to a letter from the editor in the Three Village Herald of August 2, describing how New Jersey has made developers give land for schools. He asked the voters to consider the matter seriously.

Mr. Melville said one developer had promised to give 28 acres for a school, and another probably would give about 20 acres.

Miss Fallon asked why the Board wanted to purchase land at this time, if some is to be given.

Mr. Melville explained that this purchase would add to the Nassakeag School property. He commented that the District would have to build two or three schools within the next five years.

There was some discussion of double sessions, and Mr. Melville stated that there is no financial saving in double sessions, but there is an educational loss to the students.

It was suggested that the information meetings prior to voting meetings should give more facts to the voters, and that the Board might plan better. Mr. Melville pointed out that this is very difficult, because of the very rapid growth of the community, but that the Board's long-term projections had been consistently close for a number of years.

The Chairman appointed Mr. Fred Harrison and Mr. Harry Bodeman as Inspectors of Ballots, and Mrs. Edith Baker as Assistant Clerk.

At 9:16 p.m. the Chairman requested a motion that the balloting be opened, and to continue until 10:30 p.m., or until everyone in the room at that time has had an opportunity to vote. Colonel Norris made the motion, it was seconded by Mrs. Raseman, and carried.

The voting started at once, and there was no more discussion.

At 10:30 p.m. Mr. Mitton asked if there were any more in the room who wished to vote, then declared the balloting closed.

The Inspectors retired to count the ballots.

At 11:20 p.m. the Inspectors reported the count, and the Chairman read the following report:



The Annual Meeting of qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 2, Town of Brookhaven, held at the Setauket School, Setauket, New York, was called to order at 8 p.m. by Mrs. Elizabeth L. McColgin, Clerk.

Mrs. McColgin read the notice of the Annual Meeting, a copy of which is a part of these minutes. The Clerk announced that notice of the meeting was published four times in the Port Jefferson Times and the Three Village Herald.

Mrs. McColgin appointed Mrs. Jeannette Stevens as Clerk of the Meeting.

Mrs. McColgin turned the meeting over to the Chairman, Mr. John Mitton.

The Chairman introduced the candidate for Trustee, Dr. Victor Bond. Dr. Bond promised to make every effort to uphold the high standards of the Board of Education.

The Chairman read the qualifications of a voter, and explained them.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the meeting should be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

It was moved that the polls for election of a member of the School Board be open from 8:30 pm to 10:30 p.m., or until everyone qualified to vote who is in the polling places had an opportunity to cast his vote. This was seconded, and carried.

The Chairman appointed the following Inspectors of Ballots for the Budget:

Mrs. Betty Griffith
Mr. Dennis Hutchinson

Mrs. McColgin read the category headings and amounts of the Budget.

Mr. Melville moved that the budget be approved.

The Chairman called for discussion, but there was none.

Mr. Sinclair Hatch, President of the Emma S. Clark Memorial Library Association, moved the following amendment to the Budget:

RESOLVED that the sum of \$30,000 be appropriated annually for the operation and maintenance, including the enlargement, of The Emma S. Clark Memorial Library, so long as it shall be a free association library serving the inhabitants of this school district, and that the school district budget for 1964-65, and until changed by further vote each yearly school district budget, shall be and hereby is amended to add such appropriation thereto.

Mr. Hatch explained the reasons for the increase from \$12,000 last year to \$15,000 for maintenance, and \$15,000 for starting an addition to the existing library building. He said the Library trustees would probably come to the District for similar help for the next four years, unless in the future some other aid becomes available.

The amendment was seconded.

Mr. Slavin asked if it were possible to add an amendment that the School Board should be represented on the Board of Trustees of the Library.

Mr. Melville said it was not possible to make such a motion because the District was going to vote on the Budget, so an amendment such as that was out of order.

Mr. Hatch explained that this is a free association library, not a public library, and is simply requesting help so the free services may be provided.

The Chairman stated that such an amendment could not legally be voted upon under the Rules.

There was a question from the floor, as to what insurance the District had that the Library would not suddenly refuse any more free service.

Mr. Hatch said that the funds are in trust to be used for free service, and could not be used if there were no free service.

Mr. Melville said that if the Library did not meet the standards of the State Education Department, it would lose its charter, and the Education Department would take control.

It was asked if the Library is a member of the Library Association, and Mr. Hatch said it is.

Mr. Hatch said that the circulation at the Library had increased from 19,000 four years ago, to 60,000 in 1963.

There was a question as to why there is no representation for the taxpayers, and Mr. Hatch said the taxpayers are represented when they vote on the amendment.

There was more discussion of the Library, and finally there was a comment from the floor that the people of the District are fortunate to have such a good building endowed, without original cost to the District, and that it is an excellent opportunity to improve a fine library at a nominal fee.

and
It was moved, /seconded that the debate be closed, and the meeting proceed with the question. The Chairman called for a voice vote, and the motion was approved unanimously.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Rules of Order be set aside to permit voting on the amendment concurrently with the Budget.

Mr. Christopher Hayden moved to amend the budget in one of two ways: to increase the present limit of transportation furnished to private and parochial schools out of the District to 20 miles from home to school attended, at an estimated cost of \$5,400, for the school year 1964-65, or to increase the present limit to 35 miles from home to school attended, at an additional cost of \$3,600.

The Chairman explained that the suggested amendment must ask for a specific distance and amount to be added to the Budget.

Mr. Hayden moved that the Budget be amended to add \$9,000 for the purpose of transporting private and parochial students up to 35 miles from home to school attended, and this was seconded.

The previous question was moved and seconded and, because of uncertainty, the Chairman called for a standing vote, counted by the tellers. The Chairman declared the motion defeated.

After further discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried that the debate be closed.

It was moved and seconded that the Rules of Order be set aside to permit voting on this amendment concurrently with that on the Budget. This was unanimously approved.


